Collaborate with others to give your community the opportunity to provide meaningful gifts for any occasion.

A Living Gift Market is a chance for your group to reach people in need, both near and far. You can change the lives of people you will never meet, but who dream under the same stars as you. They dream of having enough food, a chance to support their families and the opportunity to send their children to school. Meanwhile, you dream of less hustle and bustle and a way to connect in the spirit of sharing.

IFT MARKET

Do the Basic Model:

Share alternative gift information and living gift lists with shoppers in advance to help them plan. Then, set up a table in a high traffic area to make sales and distribute honor cards.

Or the Expanded Model:

A Living Gift Market can last a few hours, a few days or just 30 minutes.

Heifer animals are represented in decorated booths or on tables.

Shoppers visit the booths, learn about each animal and select gifts from a list.


Payments are processed at a central location, and buyers receive honor cards and envelopes for each purchase of \$10 or more.

Assemble a planning group. Designate a chairperson. Use social media to promote your event, along with local television, radio and newspaper community calendars.

Think about who will attend. Will this market be for members only? A larger group? An entire community? Your audience will determine your next steps.

 Recruit volunteers and helpers for everything from setup to teardown. Make copies of the living gift list portion of the attached centerspread envelope or download from www.heifer.org/livinggiftlist. Ask creative people to design booths. Other volunteers can process payments, hand out living gift lists or give directions. Booth volunteers should be knowledgeable about the animal they represent, including its cost and how it serves Heifer families around the world.



Order honor cards, posters, gift catalogs and other free promotional resources from www.heifer.org/livinggiftlist to promote your event early.
 Each gift of \$10 or more receives an honor card and envelope that buyers can send to the people they've honored with a gift.

Publicize the event. Let your audience know about your Living Gift
 Market. Hang flyers in local libraries, restaurants and other businesses.
 Post announcements to social media channels and online news sources, and ask others involved to help promote the event.

Make it fun. A Living Gift Market is a celebration, so enhance the party with decorations, music and entertainment. Serve refreshments for donations. Show Heifer videos in a special viewing corner or room. Videos can be streamed or downloaded from www.vimeo.com/heifer.

Collect payments easily. Living Gift Market shoppers can make checks payable to Heifer International. Shoppers who wish to use a credit card can complete the "Gift Order Form" found at www.heifer.org/livinggiftlist. After the event, use the enclosed envelope to send in your checks and living gift list.

Sheep bring sheer joy

Sheep are famous for their wool, and for good reason – it's a valuable resource that provides warm clothing for families who live in cold conditions. And their milk is a delicious source of protein and nutrients. These hearty animals navigate the rockiest hills and pastures with ease and can survive nearly anywhere in the world.






COMMUNITY BONDING

Pigs are an excellent fit for some of the poorest families we serve. They create a steady supply of organic fertilizer, which nourishes crops. They have large litters of piglets, which can be sold for income, and they are a reliable source of nutritious protein. 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Trees for every season

Your tree gift includes seedlings and saplings. Recipients learn how to nurture their young trees for reforestation, fruit, vegetables, firewood, fodder, soil enrichment and air purification. ADD HEIFER TO YOUR ALTERNATIVE GIVING FAIR

Keystone United Church of Christ in Seattle, Washington, has a long history of supporting alternative giving. Each year, the church hosts A Festival of Hope to support several self-help and advocacy nonprofit organizations, both local and international. The event features booths where folks can purchase baked goods, deli lunches, books, and vintage and holiday items. Participants can also make donations to Heifer at a table staffed by volunteers. There's even a special

corner where children can make crafts. Proceeds are equally divided and given to select organizations that work to end hunger and poverty.

Keystone's fair gives both congregation and community members the opportunity to purchase gifts that support the work of a number of organizations. Additionally, it allows the congregation to give its time by staffing booths, creating goods to sell or organizing the event. ■




Honeybees sweeten a family's financial future



Agift of bees includes a bee package, hive, box and beekeeping training. Beekeepers boost their incomes by selling honey, wax and pollen. As pollinators, bees make crops grow more abundantly, dramatically improving fruit and vegetable yields on small farms. Sometimes the smallest gifts make the largest impact.

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Rabbits reward families



Rabbits make great additions to family farms. These prolific animals can have as many as six litters in a single year, making Passing on the Gift possible for several families in a short period of time. They also provide organic fertilizer, which boosts the production of nutritious crops.

SIMPLE APPROACH, BIG REWARDS

Sto its Living Gift Market, and the results are impressive. Every Sunday between Thanksgiving and Christmas, volunteers from the congregation take turns staffing a table during the fellowship hour between services, giving church members the opportunity to give to our work.

Their Living Gift Market table features photos and captions from our publications, honor cards and gift catalogs. They keep the decorations simple — a tablecloth and a few wooden animal cutouts. Signs posted in the fellowship hall are updated weekly by volunteers with the total funds collected so the congregation can keep track of the progress toward the goal of a Gift Ark.

This Living Gift Market is an annual activity for the Saratoga Springs United Methodist Church. Every year, church members look forward to this opportunity to support Heifer, finish some holiday shopping and make a positive change in the world. ■

Goats

A goat is one tough animal. Goats can survive in almost any climate, due in part to their open-minded approach to eating: almost anything goes. Legend has it that a goat herder in Ethiopia discovered coffee after noticing his goats' high-energy frolicking after eating berries from certain plants.

Honeybees

The practice of collecting honey dates back to the Stone Age. Archaeologists have found pots of honey in ancient Egyptian tombs and were startled to find the honey unspoiled and perfectly preserved, proving honey's indefinite shelf life.

Water Buffalo

Water buffalo are sturdy draft animals that help farmers plow fields and carry heavy loads to market. Unlike mechanical tractors, they don't need fuel to run or mechanics to fix broken parts.

Llamas

Few animals can thrive in the harsh conditions of the Andean highlands, but llamas and their alpaca cousins are uniquely suited to the task. Their dense, soft wool keeps them warm, and they like to eat scrub vegetation that other grazers wouldn't touch.

Tree Seedlings Trees are some of

the largest and oldest organisms in existence. The tallest tree, a redwood that has been named Hyperion, is 379 feet tall. The oldest tree, a bristlecone pine called Methuselah, is nearly 5,000 years old.

What do you think fish have in common with trees? You can count their age by the number of growth rings they have on their scales. The farming of fish and other aquatic creatures is known as aquaculture.

Piqs

Pigs are useful for more than just making bacon. Because of their foraging abilities and excellent sense of smell, they are used to find truffles in many European countries. Sometimes their bristly hair is used to make brushes.





Sheep

Pastoralism has been fundamental to many civilizations, due in part to the flock behavior of sheep. Their tendency to follow and congregate closely with other members of the herd makes keeping large groups together in unfenced pastures possible. SHEEP: \$120; SHARE: \$10
